

TTAG Scholarships

The Marie Curie TTAG Scholarship was established by the AAUW-SF Board in 2021 to offer Tech Trek Alumnae, who are active members of the Tech Trek Alumnae Group (TTAG), a \$4,000 scholarship to support their college related expenses as they attend a 2- or 4-year college.

The scholarship was advertised in the December, January and February TTAG Newsletter issues, and application deadline was February 15, 2023. While no applications were received last year, the TTAG scholarship Review Committee, formed by Mary Renner, Susan Pollack and myself, was excited to receive not one but three applications this year!

The applications were reviewed and discussed at our monthly TTAG Committee Meeting in April. We were impressed at their quality and moved to ask the Board to possibly consider all three applicants. With fifteen students potentially applying in 2024, we will soon have to put our scoring system to good use!

In the meantime, we are glad to share Kimia Sattary's thank you note, as it is addressed not only to the Scholarship Review Committee but to all branch members who are making these scholarships possible.

Kimia has been participating in Tech Trek candidate selection interviews, Tech Trek Send Off and Welcome Back Parties ever since she returned from her Tech Trek experience in 2016. In addition, Kimia participated with enthusiasm to a TTAG college workshop in 2021, and to our most recent Tech Trek Alumnae online panel, just a few weeks ago. Reflections





Born almost a century apart, Louise and Amanda have something very important in common. They shared a love of poetry as an art form and as an expression of strong feelings. Both served in one of the most esteemed positions in our nation as our U.S. poet laureate.

Maine-born and a child of an unstable marriage, Louise Bogan was able to receive an adequate education with the assistance of a generous female mentor. She became a writer of lyric poetry, fiction, and literary criticism. She held the Library of Congress consultancy post from 1945 to 1946. She was the fourth poet, but the first woman chosen by the Library of Congress. Back then, the position was known as the consultantship in poetry in the English language. In 1985 just as Gwendolyn Brooks (our first Black American woman to hold that position) was about to end her tenure, the name was changed to U.S. Poet Laureate. In 1993, Rita Dove became the first female African American official poet laureate and also the youngest at the age of 41. Since then, approximately 8 women have been chosen, about half as many as men.

Recently, Amanda Gorman came on the literary scene. She is Los Angeles born and a Harvard graduate. In 2017 at the age of 19, she was named our nation's first National Youth Poet Laureate. Every year in May there is a national competition to choose a promising youth poet to honor and help encourage the reflections of young American women poets. In 2021, Amanda became the youngest poet ever to read at President Biden's inaugural ceremony.

In her book, "The Hill We Climb", Amanda says: "For there is always light, if only we are brave enough to see it-if only we are brave enough to be it."

In Louise's words, "Innocence of heart and violence of feelings are necessary in any kind of superior achievement. The arts cannot exist without them."

Both Louise and Amanda had challenges to overcome but were spurred on by their desire to share their thoughts and reflections through poetry that we can all enjoy today.

Marie Curie & AAUW

The year was 1919. Europe had been ravaged by World War I and radium was far too expensive for a scientist of modest means to afford for experiments. This was true even for one as famous as Madame Marie Curie. As a result, her groundbreaking research had reached a virtual standstill.

Then the AAUW came to the rescue. Members from Maine to California helped raise an astonishing \$156,413, enabling Madame Curie to purchase one gram of radium and continue her experiments that helped her create the field of nuclear chemistry and forever change the course of science. Madame Curie received the Nobel Prize for her work, but was not admitted to the French Academie des Sciences until she won an incredible second Nobel Prize...all because she was a woman. More than 75 years later, there are still only three women members.

Pay Equity

AAUW has been on the front lines fighting for Pay Equity for over a hundred years.

AAUW was there in the Oval Office in 1963 when President John F. Kennedy signed the Equal Pay Act into law.

AAUW was there in 2009 when President Barack Obama signed the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Play Act into law.

AAUW continues the fight for the passage of the Paycheck Fairness Act to ensure women have further equal pay protections. The pay gap is real.

AAUW will continue the fight to achieve pay equity; the economic security of American families depends on it.

Legal Advocacy Fund

Founded in 1981, the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) works to achieve equity for women in higher education by recognizing indicative efforts to improve the climate for women on campus; by offering assistance to women faculty, staff, and students who have grievances against colleges and universities; and by supporting sex discrimination lawsuits.

The LAF Board only approves support of cases which are currently involved in litigation, and that have the potential to set legal precedent.

The Legal Advocacy Fund's annual Progress in Equity Award recognizes indicative and replicable college and university programs.
