QUEEN OF THE SOAPS

For many years soap operas have remained popular weekly radio and television programs. Usually the plots revolved around day to day life situations of ordinary people. They usually featured ensemble casts and melodramatic story lines that spanned several episodes. Each program ended with "cliffhangers" to encourage followers to tune in on a regular basis. These dramas began in the thirties first on the radio and later moved to television. Originally soap manufacturers such as Proctor and Gamble sponsored these programs as a way of putting their cleaning products before the listening public, women being the larger targeted viewing group. Because the scripts reminded many of the often unhappy or emotional drama of operas, the term "soap operas" gained use to describe these well liked shows. Many aired for way over twenty years.

Irna Phillips was a prime mover in the development of this genre of programming. Cliffhangers were just one of her innovative ideas

that began to define the soaps. From the 1930s through the 1970s, Irna Phillips was known by many media publications as the "Queen of the Soaps." She is credited with creating a daytime serial format with inclusive programming that changed as the social culture and women's roles evolved. A hard taskmaster, many of the best known and long lasting soaps such as *Guiding Light*, *As the World Turns*, and *Another World* came to be. Irna was a talented scriptwriter, screenwriter, casting agent, and actress all rolled into one.

Some of her story lines echoed her own not always happy life. Irna's father had died when she was 8 leaving her mother alone to raise 10 children. As a child she played by herself a lot making up long and involved stories for her dolls to play out. Drama and journalism were her chosen subjects for her two master's degrees. After a short career as an actress and a drama teacher, she took a job as a staff writer on a daytime talk show. Irna created the serial *Painted Dreams* which aired daily on a local Chicago radio station. From then on the serial soap operas became her specialty. Fiercely independent, she often argued with the sponsors, censors, and even the actors. On occasion she took her superiors to court to get proper credit for her role in creating or co-creating nearly several dozen programs over her 40 plus years in the business. She herself was hired and fired by different television stations. She learned in her career never create a show that she did not at least partially own.

Marie Curie & AAUW

The year was 1919. Europe had been ravaged by World War I and radium was far too expensive for a scientist of modest means to afford for experiments. This was true even for one as famous as Madame Marie Curie. As a result, her groundbreaking research had reached a virtual standstill.

Then the AAUW came to the rescue. Members from Maine to California helped raise an astonishing \$156,413, enabling Madame Curie to purchase one gram of radium and continue her experiments that helped her create the field of nuclear chemistry and forever change the course of science. Madame Curie received the Nobel Prize for her work, but was not admitted to the French *Academie des Sciences* until she won an incredible second Nobel Prize...all because she was a woman. More than 75 years later, there are still only three women members.

Pay Equity

AAUW has been on the front lines fighting for Pay Equity for over a hundred years.

AAUW was there in the Oval Office in 1963 when President John F. Kennedy signed the Equal Pay Act into law.

AAUW was there in 2009 when President Barack Obama signed the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act into law.

AAUW continues the fight for the passage of the Paycheck Fairness Act to ensure women have further equal pay protections. The pay gap is real.

AAUW will continue the fight to achieve pay equity; the economic security of American families depends on it.

Legal Advocacy Fund

Founded in 1981, the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) works to achieve equity for women in higher education by recognizing indicative efforts to improve the climate for women on campus; by offering assistance to women faculty, staff, and students who have grievances against colleges and universities; and by supporting sex discrimination lawsuits.

The LAF Board only approves support of cases which are currently involved in litigation, and that have the potential to set legal precedent.

The Legal Advocacy Fund’s annual Progress in Equity Award recognizes indicative and replicable college and university programs.
