TECH TREK is a program started in 1998 by AAUW-CA whereby we send 7th grade girls to a college campus (Stanford or CSU Fresno at the present time) for one week in which they live in a dorm and take STEM classes taught by women. We pay approximately \$1000 for each girl we send and they pay \$50. We can always use help interviewing the applicants and choosing who goes, as well as contacting the school math and science teachers in San Francisco and keeping that list up-to-date. TTAG

The **Tech Trek Alumnae Group (TTAG, tee tag) Program** was launched in 2019 to support Tech Trek Alumnae in their pursuit of STEM disciplines and careers throughout high school, college and beyond. In addition to creating a community of like-minded Tech Trek Alumnae, TTAG organizes college readiness workshops, Women in STEM career panels, and events tailored to TTAG's goals and interests (visits to hands-on science museums, science classes, etc.). Finally, a **TTAG Scholarship** offers Tech Trek Alumnae who are members of the AAUW-SF TTAG up to \$16,000 over 4 years to support their college-related expenses as they attend college.

SILVER JUBILEE SCHOLARSHIPS

AAUW-SF offers scholarships of \$3,000 to help women in their final two years of undergraduate study and women in graduate study programs at an accredited college or university. Candidates must have a permanent address in San Francisco or be attending a university or college within a 100-mile distance of San Francisco.

The Silver Jubilee Scholarship Fund was established in 1916 to celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of the San Francisco branch of AAUW. The San Francisco branch, founded by Sarah Dix Hamlin, is the second oldest in the United States, and has pioneered the role of women in California education. Promoting higher education is a major goal of AAUW. The Silver Jubilee Scholarship Fund has assisted our branch in meeting this goal. Through the years, many AAUW-SF branch members have contributed to the Scholarship Fund. The largest bequest was made in 1982 by Mildred Bickel and enabled the establishment of the Gordon Bickel Fund. This Fund has allowed the expansion of AAUW-SF's scholarship program.
